Marianist Reflection of the Week



Observation of Marianist Martyrs

This past Saturday, September 18, 2010, Marianists around the world celebrated three Marianist Brothers who were killed in Spain in 1936 for proclaiming their Catholic faith.

Brothers Carlos, Jesus, and Fidel were teachers who manifested their alliance with Mary and dedication to her mission to bring Jesus to the world through their ministry and education. We seek to imitate their bold and courageous faith in our lives. Brothers Carlos, Jesus, and Fidel were declared Blessed by the Catholic Church in 1995.

History

Carlos Eraña was born in Aozaraza-Arechavaleta, Spain, on November 2, 1884. He professed vows in the Society of Mary (Marianists) in 1903. He dedicated his whole life to the Christian education of children. He was Director in the Marianist schools in Ciudad, Real, Tetuan (Morocco), and Madrid. When the religious persecution began, he moved to Ciudad Real, where he had earlier worked so hard on behalf of the very poor. This time, however, he was imprisoned, and on September 18, 1936, he was shot because he was a religious educator.

Fidel Fuidio was born in Yecora, Spain, on April 24, 1880. He dedicated himself to the service of God in the Society of Mary in 1897. He was an excellent educator and easily gained the trust of the young. He gave his students an eagerness for research. He spent three months in Ciudad Real in painful captivity, which he endured with great faith and fortitude. He was shot on October 17, 1936.

Jesús Hita was born in Calahorra, Spain, on April 17, 1900. He made his religious profession as a Marianist in 1918. He was dedicated to teaching, devoting himself to the Christian education of youth. During the religious persecution he lived for two months in the home of a pious family. He prepared himself for martyrdom in the company of two Passionists. He was martyred on September 25, 1936, out of hatred for the faith.

These three were beatified by Pope John Paul II on October 1, 1995.

UIW's First LSC Win is a Thriller By: Blake Hurtick

Incarnate Word seemed to be on the verge of turning an upset of conference foe Central Oklahoma into one doozy of an overtime heartbreaker.

Then, Trent Rios showed why he's the leader of the young Cardinals.

The small-statured sophomore had already accounted for 170 total yards, running and passing for touchdowns. But his highlight came when he reeled in a 9-yard swing pass for the winning touchdown in overtime, giving the Cardinals a 42-41 victory Saturday night at Benson Stadium — their first triumph in the Lone Star Conference.

"It's why we recruited him," said coach Mike Santiago, who has never lost in overtime in his career, including 2-0 at UIW. "He's just a great football player."

That wasn't the only drama from the extra period.

The Bronchos (1-2, 1-1 Lone Star Conference) scored easily on just five plays to open overtime. But UIW linebacker Dakota Mawyer gave the Cardinals (1-2, 1-1) a window of hope by blocking Chris Robbs' extra point.

"There's no scheme for blocking an extra point," Santiago said. "It's just a bunch of 'want to.'"

That window closed quickly. The Cardinals' first three plays netted zero yards. But Central Oklahoma cornerback Randy Stanley bailed them out by dragging down receiver Derrick Walls for pass interference on fourth-and-10. The Bronchos committed 10 penalties for 90 yards.

Rios and kicker Thomas Rebold took it from there.

Backup quarterback Paden Lynch had a school-record 130 rushing yards in his first career start, including long runs of 66 and 31 yards. He only completed nine of 21 passes for 91 yards, but Santiago was impressed with the sophomore from D'Hanis as he led the Cardinals to 413 total yards — 304 on the ground.

The Cardinals entered the season predicted to finish last in the tough Lone Star Conference and most believed they would be lucky to get a single win. But after Saturday night's result, they believe they proved something.

"They believe," Santiago said. "We can play in the best Division II league in the United States. We can play."

Horns Change Tune in Lubbock By: Mike Finger

LUBBOCK — In the old days, "winning time" for Texas meant putting the football in the air. By late Saturday, though, that tactic didn't seem so enticing. On a night when the pigskin batted off of hands and bodies at Jones AT&T Stadium like a Flubber pinball, the sixth-ranked Longhorns needed an approach less fraught with danger. Their goal for the past nine months had been to be able to run the ball when they needed to do it. And for the first time in what seemed like ages, that's exactly what they did. Two years after their inability to grind out a few extra yards and seconds against Texas Tech on the South Plains cost them a perfect season, the Longhorns finally wore down the Red Raiders in a 24-14 victory Saturday. In front of a record Tech crowd of 60,054, UT didn't abandon the pass on a game-clinching, 22-play, second-half touchdown drive. But the key plays — a Tre' Newton draw, a fake punt, and five bruising runs from Cody Johnson — all came on the ground. In the end, it was an evening of atonement not only for Curtis Brown and Blake Gideon — the two UT defensive backs who avenged their 2008 miscues with 2010 interceptions — but also for the Longhorns in general. "We know how tough it is to win in Lubbock," said UT coach Mack Brown, who's now 4-3 at Tech and 10-3 against the Red Raiders overall. "We're excited about how tough we were tonight." For the game, UT (3-0, 1-0 Big 12) managed only 93 yards on 43 carries. But when they took possession late in the third quarter, clinging to a 17-14 lead, the toughness they'd talked about all summer began to manifest itself. Newton's 13-yard run and Garrett Gilbert's 6-yard scramble helped negate an early penalty. Mack Brown called a gutsy fake punt on fourth-and-1 from his own 29, and up-back Ryan Roberson executed it perfectly. Then, after Gilbert completed two huge third-down throws to James Kirkendoll and Tech defensive back Will Ford committed two costly personal fouls, the Longhorns handed the ball — and the game — to Johnson. He bullied his way to 12 of the final 13 yards of the drive, including a two-yard plunge on fourth-and-1. By the final play of the march, Tech (2-1, 0-1) was so focused on stopping the run that Gilbert was able to toss a play-action pass to Barrett Matthews for the 1-yard touchdown. "It really is just a testament to the fight of our offensive unit," Gilbert said. Gilbert, who completed 21 of 36 passes for 227 yards and two scores, didn't get much help from his teammates early on. On all three of his interceptions, the ball was tipped — twice by Tech defensive end, and once by UT receiver Malcolm Williams. The most damaging turnover came late in the first quarter, when the Longhorns were threatening to go ahead 21-0 before Jarvis Phillips made the first of his two interceptions and returned it 87 yards to make it 14-7. UT receivers dropped at least six passes in the game, and the Longhorns also committed 11 penalties for 95 yards. The UT defense, on the other hand, delivered one of their finest performances in recent years. The Longhorns held Tech to just 144 total yards, forcing three turnovers and sacking Tech's quarterbacks four times. "We couldn't slow their front down," Tech coach Tommy Tuberville said. "They turned it loose on us in the second half." Two years ago, when Tech beat then-No. 1 UT in dramatic fashion, a dropped potential interception by Gideon and a missed tackle by Curtis Brown allowed the Red Raiders to score the winning touchdown with one second left. Saturday, Gideon picked off a tipped pass almost identical to the one he couldn't handle in 2008, and Brown returned his own interception 74 yards to set up Justin Tucker's go-ahead field goal.
